Introductory Notes

Peculiar People is a story of ordinary people doing extraordinary things. Most of the characters in the book do not know Jesus when you first encounter them. Consequently, they are still enslaved by sin, and I write frankly (but not graphically) about those sins. As a result, I consider this an adult book, although the behaviors described are generally tamer than one would find on virtually any television show.

The major characters are flawed, as we all are, and even those who surrender their lives to Christ sometimes continue to fall short of God's hopes for them. This is because I wanted the characters in Peculiar People to be realistic—in other words, to be like you and me. I sincerely hope that no reader is offended by the actions of any of the characters, whether fictional or biblical, but I do hope you are shocked. I believe one of the biggest problems in our world is our casual acceptance of sin.

In the back of the book I have included four tables:

- A listing of some of the events in the story—which are biblical, extrabiblical, and fictional
- A listing of the characters in the book, primarily organized by their principle locale
- An annotated bibliography of the books I read in researching and writing Peculiar People—if there are specific incidents or themes, which intrigue you, I suggest you refer to some of these books.
- References to the biblical quotes in the story

I believe you will find Peculiar People to be engaging, instructive, amusing, disturbing, and ultimately inspiring. I hope you enjoy it, but most of all, I hope it touches you in some way.

Incidentally, the book title comes from the King James translation of 1 Peter 2:9. The phrase **ἔθνος ἁγίου ἰσραήλ** (laos ice peripoiesis) literally means "a people of possession."
